SMSC	<ol> <li>Fieldwork, trips and relevant activities beyond the classroom are all ways of ensuring pupils' SMSC development as they become more aware of the world around them, differences and similarities about culture, race and ways of living.</li> </ol>	
	<ol> <li>Learning about the world around us promotes pupils spiritual development as they learn about real people in real places. This starts with knowledge of themselves, before progressing to knowledge of others near-by and then far away.</li> </ol>	
	<ol> <li>Enable students to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence through building on their local knowledge about where they live taught in EYFS.</li> </ol>	

British Values	<b>Democracy</b> ; encourage respect for democracy by making decisions together or voting for ways to improve the school environment.
	Rule of Law; enable students to distinguish right from wrong as we enjoy the great outdoors respectfully.
	<b>Respect and Tolerance;</b> encourage students to accept responsibility for their behaviour and be aware of their impact on others, for example, taking our rubbish home after a school trip
	<b>Individual Liberty</b> : Children should develop a positive sense of themselves. Staff can provide opportunities for children to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and increase their confidence in their own abilities, for example through allowing children to talk about their experiences and learning.
