DfE guidance issued 28th November 2021 states:

Face coverings

Face coverings should be worn in communal areas in all settings by staff, visitors and pupils or students in year 7 and above, unless they are exempt. Pupils or students (in year 7 or above) should continue to wear face coverings on public and dedicated school transport, unless they are exempt.

Testing

All educational and childcare settings should continue to encourage staff and students to test twice weekly using lateral flow device (LFD) tests.

Contact tracing and isolation

The <u>current guidance on contact tracing and isolation</u> remains in place. In addition to these, any suspected or confirmed close contacts of the Omicron variant will be asked to isolate for 10 days regardless of vaccination status or age. You will be contacted directly and told to isolate.

Vaccination

All eligible staff and students aged 12 and over are encouraged to take up the offer of the vaccine, including boosters.

Vaccines are our best defence against COVID-19. They help protect young people and adults, and benefit those around them. Vaccination makes people less likely to catch the virus and less likely to pass it on.

Changes to the red list for international travel to England

Individuals arriving in England from red list countries must follow the <u>red list</u> rules.



South Africa, Botswana, Eswatini, Lesotho, Namibia and Zimbabwe moved onto the red list at 12pm Friday 26 November.

Angola, Malawi, Mozambique and Zambia were added to the red list 4am Sunday 28 November.

Schools, out of school settings and colleges will want to consider whether to go ahead with planned international educational visits at this time, recognising the risk of disruption to education resulting from the need to isolate and test on arrival back into the UK.

This plan outlines the actions Greensand schools will take in response to a local outbreak of COVID-19. Public Health England and Local Authorities are responsible for deciding whether there is a local outbreak. This plan will always be activated on the direct recommendation of either of these two bodies. Headteachers may introduce additional measures, such as those listed above, if they deem it appropriate and without waiting for direction from PHE of the local authority.

National guidance for schools will always be adhered to.

This plan should be read in conjunction with the following documents that are specific to individual schools within the trust:

- Remote Learning Plan
- Covid-19 Risk Assessment
- Covid-19 LFD Testing risk assessment and plan

The school may be considered to have an outbreak and be required to put in place additional restrictions if:

- 5 children, pupils, students or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period
- 10% of children, pupils, students or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period

If an individual school is advised or decides to take any of the following measures the Headteacher should

- Consult with the CEO, or a member of the trust central team in CEO unavailable
- Inform Chair of the Local School Committee
- Review associated risk assessments and plans
- Consult with staff, (there may be occasions where consultation is not appropriate)
- Communicate with Parents
- Report decisions, rationale and proposed cessation date to <u>school.relationships@surreycc.gov.uk</u>

The central team will call a meeting of the Trust Rapid Response Committee to review provision when necessary. If advice is for one specific school within the trust, the Headteacher and Chair of the Local School Committee will be invited to attend. The Local School Committee will be kept informed.
